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I. STATEMENTS

A. Mission/Purpose:

Tomah Baptist Academy (T.B.A.) exists to primarily assist Independent Baptist families with the mental, physical, spiritual, and social development of their children by providing an affordable, safe, Bible-centered education. (Luke 2:52)

B. Affiliation:

Tomah Baptist Academy will be affiliated with the Wisconsin Association of Christian Schools and the American Association of Christian Schools. The A.A.C.S. is an association of approximately 1000 member schools across the United States. The association offers conventions, workshops, and seminars for teachers and administrators. Both academic and sports competition with state and national championships are sponsored by A.A.C.S.

C. Faith (Doctrinal Statement:)

This Church & Academy declares its faith and purpose to be embodied in the following statements:

1. The Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are inspired verbally of God and inerrant in the original writings, and they are the supreme and final authority in faith and practice.
2. There is one God, eternally existent, in three co-equal persons: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.
3. Jesus Christ, who is God the Son, was begotten by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, and is true God and true man.
4. Man was created in the image of God; sinned and thereby incurred not only physical death but that spiritual death which is separation from God; all human beings are born with a sinful nature and upon reaching moral responsibility, become sinners in thought, word, and deed.
5. The Lord Jesus Christ died for our sins, according to the Scriptures, as a representative and substitutionary sacrifice; all who believe in Him are eternally justified on the grounds of His shed blood.
6. The crucified body of our Lord was resurrected; He ascended into Heaven and lives there as our High Priest and Advocate before the

Father.

7. Christian Baptism is the immersion in water of a Believer in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, which sets forth in symbol the essential facts in redemption (the death, burial, and resurrection of Christ) and the experience of the believer (death to sin and resurrection to newness of life). Baptism is the prerequisite to the privileges of a church relationship.
8. Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ will return to the earth personally, bodily, visibly, and gloriously; and all believers should look for His imminent premillennial coming, which is the blessed hope of the church.
9. All who have received by faith the Lord Jesus Christ are born of the Holy Spirit and thereby become children of God.
10. The bodies of both the just and the unjust shall be resurrected, the saved at the first resurrection to everlasting blessedness, and the lost at the second resurrection (after the millennium) to everlasting punishment.

D. Final Determinations:

The Administration reserves the right to make the final determination in all matters of discipline, standards, and classroom conduct. This extends to all school functions.

II. CURRICULUM & STRUCTURE

A. Curriculum

1. Every student is taught Biblical principles daily. Junior High & high school students will be enrolled in a traditional Bible class. As Bible is the fundamental course of the Christian School, it is taught with the intensity and discipline expected of any class. The intent is to develop a lifelong love for study of the Bible and a commitment to following the principles of the Book of Books.
2. TBA has two basic curriculums. ACE (Accelerated Christian Education) is used for students whose parents request this program. There are also those students who benefit from individualized instruction, which ACE provides. The A-Beka DVD program is made available to students who grasp this more advanced program. Master teachers are on the DVDs and the TBA facilitator checks homework and keeps quiz and test grades.
3. The Pastor of Tomah Baptist Church is the Administrator of T.B.A.

The Deacons of the Church assist him. The Principal of T.B.A. supervises the daily functions of the school. The facilitators oversee the classroom education.

B. Classroom & Procedures

1. Permission is required to communicate with others or be out of one's office.
2. All students are encouraged to get water and use the restrooms during breaks.

C. Student Offices and Desks

1. Student offices and desks are solely for the purpose of learning activities except when special privileges have been earned.
2. Offices and desks are assigned and changed only by the supervisor or teacher.
3. Anything placed in the offices or desk must be approved by the supervisor.
4. Do not lean or sit on the offices or dividers.
5. Keep them neat and clean.
6. Offices and desks are private-do not invade!
7. When leaving office, push the chair up to the desk.
8. Any damage to an office or desk will be charged to a student's account.

D. Homework

The responsibility for scholastic achievement is placed on students in the Christian School. When your 1st-12th-grade child doesn't meet his goals for the day, he will be required to complete the work at home. It is the responsibility of the parents to see that it is finished. Any student may have a homework slip sent home, which needs parent's initials. It is to be signed and returned the following day. If the homework is not finished, the parents are to make a note of that fact and then sign it. Failure to complete homework will result in a loss of break time, privileges, or sports practice and may result in an after-school detention.

E. Fund Raising

T.B.A. will be involved in limited fundraising efforts designed to achieve specific goals (equipment project, class trip, etc.) We encourage participation but do not make participation mandatory.

F. Miscellaneous Expenses

Tuition and Material Fees cover all core curriculum textbook costs. Students will be billed for damage to any re-usable text. "Incidental" charges for curriculum and extra-curriculum expenses will be billed out quarterly. A current list of potential Incidental Expenses is kept on file in the school office and available at registration or upon request.

A minimum of 24 credits is required for high school graduation for incoming freshman in the 2004-05 school year. Any student who completes the 24 credits before he completes 8 semesters may take additional elective courses. Accounts must be paid in full before diploma is granted.

III. ADMISSIONS

A. Admissions Policy

1. Children who are members or faithful attendees of Independent Baptist churches, or whose parents are members or faithful attendees of Independent Baptist churches will be given first priority in admission to the school. K-5 students must be at least five years of age on or before September 1st of the school year of which application is made.
2. If the Administration finds it necessary to limit the number of students at any grade level, first priority will be given to regularly attending families of Tomah Baptist Church.
3. A child who is not a member or a faithful attendee of an Independent Baptist church should be a member of a family which is in active fellowship with a Bible believing, evangelical church with at least one of the parents regularly attending and serving there.
4. The parents of prospective students must state, in writing, that they have read and agree with the Statement of faith of the school, and both parents must agree, in writing, to have their children educated in accordance with it.
5. The parents of prospective students must state, in writing, that:
 - a. The school has full discretion in the discipline of their children while at school and school activities, within the bounds of the Discipline Policy.
 - b. The school has full discretion for the grade placement of their children.
 - c. They will meet all tuition, fees, and other financial obligations to the school.
 - d. That they have read, agree with, and will perform the responsibilities of the Parent's Code.
 - e. Prospective students in grades prior to high school may be given diagnostic tests to determine grade placement. High school students who come to TBA with desirable grades will not be tested.

- f. The Principal and/or Administration must interview all prospective parents and students. The Administration has final determination in the admissibility of a student to the school.
- g. The Administration may refuse to admit a student with a history of academic, disciplinary, or psychological problems.
- h. Rejection of applicants will be by written notification.
- i. TOMAH BAPTIST ACADEMY does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, physical disability, or national origin in the administration of any of its policies or programs.

In order to comply with state regulations, the completed physical report is to be presented on the first day of school. Health records are transferred with scholastic records when the children change schools.

B. Medical Guidelines

1. All students must have a medical history and an immunization from completed and on file at the school office.
2. All students are required to be vaccinated against diphtheria, pertussis (whooping cough), tetanus, polio, mumps, red measles and rubella (German measles). The immunizations may be waived for personal or religious conviction.
3. It is recommended that each student have regular physical and dental exams. Appointments should be scheduled after school, on vacation days, or weekends. Any deviation from this rule needs to be cleared with the staff two weeks prior to the appointment.
4. No medication will be given to any student without parental permission. School officials (staff) must administer prescriptions.
5. In a situation where a student needs medical attention, the staff will call the parent or family physician (in that order).

IV. GENERAL INFORMATION

A. Daily Schedule

SCHOOL DAY: The school day begins at 8 AM and ends at 3 P.M. Students may not remain in the building after 3:30 p.m. without special permission. After school care is available from 3:15 p.m. to 5 p.m.

B. Dress Code

“Whether therefore ye eat or drink or whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God.” I Cor. 10:31. “That ye may approve things that are excellent...” (Philippians 1:10). Dress standards at T.B.A. are an important part of the student’s education. They not only reflect the image of the school, but a disciplined student as well. Students reflecting Christ’s likeness, who are not running after and fashions of the world, while in school or at school activities, are a credit to themselves, their family, and the school. Dress standards demonstrate a student who is prepared to meet the academic and Spiritual challenges of the day. Generally speaking, students should dress so as to present a good image of the school to the world. Students should avoid extreme fads. Do not go to excess in any type of dress. Modesty in dress is a must. No clothing with printed pictures, numbers, or words may be worn. Clothing with our own school emblem may be worn. T-shirts and sweatshirts are unacceptable. No ragged or torn clothing is to be worn. No tight form fitting clothing may be worn. Students must dress according to our dress code on the way to and from school, and at all school functions and activities, unless a specific exception is made by the administration. The decision of the administration in all matters of dress is final.

*THREE dress code violations can result in two-day suspension.

1. Girls

The Bible teaches that women are to adorn themselves in modest apparel. Therefore, we insist on the following rules:

- a. Skirts shall be at least to the bottom of the knee while sitting **and** standing. If a skirt or dress has a slit, the top of the slit can be no higher than the bottom of the knee. (If a slit that is sewn tears a second time, that particular skirt or dress will no longer be worn to school.)
- b. Shorts, sun dresses, dresses with low necklines, or other types of clothing deemed immodest by the school administration may not be worn in the classroom or at school activities. Necklines must be no lower than two finger widths below the clavicle including banquet dresses and other formal attire.
- c. Culottes will be deemed appropriate for certain administratively approved activities.
- d. Denim skirts **will** be considered appropriate dress for school. Bib-top jumpers that resemble men’s bib overalls are not

- appropriate. No faded denim is allowed.
- e. Students who wear immodest clothing may be asked to put on another garment over the improper article, or they may be sent home in the case of repeated violation.
 - f. High school girls may wear nail polish and lip gloss, but polish and gloss must be clear; no colors.
 - g. Hair coloring changes such as severe or unnatural coloring, tinting, streaking will not be allowed.
 - h. Girls will be allowed to wear sandal type footwear during months of Aug., Sept., & May. The administration reserves the right to forbid certain sandals, which are deemed inappropriate. During non sandal months socks or nylons must be worn.
 - i. T-shirts and T-shirt style shirts are not acceptable classroom attire. Shirts are to be buttoned up except for the top button. "Billboard" shirts or shirts with numbers or advertising are not acceptable.

2. Boys

- a. Dress pants are required. Corduroy pants are acceptable. No denim is allowed. Pants that have the 'cargo' or 'carpenter' pockets are not acceptable school attire.
- b. T-shirts and T-shirt style shirts are not acceptable classroom attire. Shirts are to be buttoned up except for the top button. "Billboard" shirts or shirts with numbers or advertising are not acceptable.
- c. Boy's shoes that reflect a feminine style in shape or heel will not be permitted. Students may not wear athletic shoes to school for any thing other than athletics or a physical education function. Hiking boots that look like athletic shoes are not allowed.
- d. No jewelry, including necklaces, may be worn.
- e. Shirttails are to be tucked in and belts are to be worn.
- f. Hair is to be cut and groomed at all times. Long hair will not be permitted. Hair is to be combed off the forehead so that it does not fall down over the eyebrows or the eyes. Hair coloring changes and tinting will not be allowed. Sideburns are not to come lower than the middle of the ear opening. Shaggy hair will not be permitted. Beards and mustaches will not be allowed. No partial head or full head shaving or step cuts will be allowed.
- g. Ties may be required for special functions or Sports games.

C. Conduct Code

Fridays will occasionally be dress up day for Middle Classroom and Upper

Classroom students. This means a nice dress shirt and tie for the boys and neat non-denim skirts/dresses for the ladies. The Biblical portrait of conduct under any authority is that of a submissive heart to the authority. The role of authority is to reward good and punish evil (II Cor. 5:10, Rom. 13:1-5). For this reason T.B.A. has developed a system of “Merits” which add up to privileges and awards, and “Demerits” which could end up in suspension or dismissal.

General Conduct:

Each student is expected to have a proper relationship toward fellow students; not arguing, fighting, gossiping, evil speaking, poking fun, pushing, or throwing things at people. Cursing, vulgar talking, telling off-color stories, talking about rock music or other ungodly things will not be tolerated. No guns, knives, radios, etc. will be permitted at school.

D. Merit & Demerit System

Merits:

Merits may be given in each learning center at the Supervisor’s discretion. Merits may be gained for chapel music, student service, high-test grades, quality reports, quality work, early Scripture memory, etc.

Demerits:

The demerit system is a guide for discipline at T.B.A. The positive side of discipline is stressed according to Proverbs 22:6. The administration expects students at T.B.A. to be different and to maintain the highest standards of behavior at all times. Failure to comply with the standards of conduct will result in the issuing of demerits. The teacher or other school personnel will recommend demerits for a student to the administration that will make the final decision. Students receive demerits according to a written guide. Students who accumulate fifty (50) demerits in a semester will lose the privilege of attending T.B.A. for the remainder of that year. A student who accumulates twenty-five (25) demerits in successive semesters may not re-enroll without approval of the administration. Demerits will be indicated on report cards each marking period. Any student accumulating twenty-five (25) demerits in one semester will

be suspended. The student may also lose the privilege of participating in extra-curricular activities. Students with demerits totaling between 25 and 50 may “work off” a maximum of 10 demerits per semester by doing work after school or on Saturdays at the discretion of the principal. Demerits will be “worked off” at the rate of 2 per hour. Students who receive less than 5 demerits in a semester will have no record of this on their permanent file. A student will begin with 0 demerits each semester. The administration reserves the right at all times to take whatever action it feels necessary in any given situation. The following is a list of many areas covered by our demerit system. The numbers above the offence is the number of demerits to be given for each successive violation. The last number will repeat for each additional violation. (Example: Talking, 1,1,2,3. The student will receive 1 demerit each time for the first two times, 2 demerits for the third offence, and 3 demerits for each offence thereafter.)

A. Minor Offence:

 - i. Talking or noise in the halls
 - ii. Tardy between classes.

 - i. Talking or unnecessary noise in class.
 - ii. No parental note for absences.

 - iv. Gum chewing or eating.
 - v. No class supplies or books.
 - vi. Out of order.
 - vii. No P.E. clothes.

- c. 1, 2, 3
 - i. Communications not signed and returned.
 - ii. Passing and/or reading notes.
 - iii. Make-up slip lost or not returned in by due date.

- d. 1, 3
 - i. Outside literature.
 - ii. Dress code violations.
 - iii. Derogatory remarks to other students.

- e. 2, 5
 - i. Attitude.
 - ii. Late for detention.
- B. Major Offences:
 - a. 5, 10 suspension.
 - i. Skipping class.
 - ii. Improper language
 - iii. Criticizing teachers or school policy.
 - iv. Intentional disobedience or arguing (insubordination).
 - v. Fighting.
 - vi. Improper conduct between boy and girl.
 - vii. Acts of vandalism on the campus or within building(s).
 - g. 10, suspension, subject to expulsion.
 - i. Lying, cheating, stealing.
 - ii. Any occult activity.
 - iii. Major disrespect.
 - iv. Skipping school.
 - h. 25, 25
 - i. Possession and/or use of Tobacco.
 - i. 50 Automatic Expulsion
 - i. Possession of Drugs and/or Drug Paraphernalia
 - ii. Use of Drugs
 - iii. Distribution of Prescription Drugs
 - iv. Possession of Alcohol
 - v. Use of Alcohol
 - vi. Immorality

NOTE:

The demerit system is basically used with Upper Classroom students. Parents of younger students will be given the opportunity to sign discipline form, which does not use demerits. Younger students will be awarded merits. While all students begin each semester with 0 demerits, a major offence committed in the first semester is retained as a first offence throughout the year. (Example: a student who skips school once first semester will be suspended the second time if it is during second semester). In addition to the above, T.B.A. is opposed to gambling, dancing,

Contemporary Christian Music, and rock music. Couples at T.B.A. may sit together during lunch and at other appropriate times, but close sitting in gyms and any school activity is not allowed. Handholding, kissing, embracing, and close facial contact are not allowed. Couples are not to seek out any secluded areas including classrooms when others are not present. This is not a complete list, as it applies to improper boy-girl conduct no.

If any kindergarten parent wishes their child spanked, permission must be given in writing. The procedure will be to notify the parent whenever possible and encourage them to come and administer the spanking. If unavailable, then a designated adult will administer the spanking in front of 1-2 adult witnesses. No more than 2 swats on the bottom will be administered on a given day.

Detention hall begins at 3:00 and ends at 3:30. Students will be responsible for providing their own transportation home after detention hall. A student will always be give a minimum of 24 hours notice before a detention is to be served. If a student does not show up to serve a detention on the day it was to be served, and additional detention will be given. When a student receives six detentions in a quarter (and every third one thereafter), a one-day suspension will be assessed.

E. Suspension:

A student who is suspended may receive either an in-school suspension or an out-of-school suspension, depending on the reason. During an in-school suspension the student will still attend school but will work alone in a room. Out-of-school suspensions will be considered absences.

F. Counseling:

Students may see the Pastor by appointment to receive counseling in academic, spiritual, or social areas, guidance for job and college selection will be based on the principles of God's Word. The Bible says, "Walk not in the counsel of the ungodly." A pastor who knows the Word of God is a faithful counselor.

G. Visitors:

We always are happy to have parents visit the school. All visitors should stop at the school office first and not go directly to the classroom. A parent

who wishes to observe in the classroom must do so by arrangement with the principal. A parent who desires to confer with a teacher regarding any problem should arrange a consultation with the teacher before the school day begins or after the school day is over.

H. Teacher Visitation:

The teacher will endeavor to visit the home of each pupil at least once during the school year. The parent may invite the teacher at a convenient time, or the teacher may call ahead of time for an appointment.

I. Grievance Procedure:

If a student or parent has a problem or complaint, he or she should first approach the teacher to discuss the problem. If the problem is not resolved there, and the students, teachers, parents, and the principal cannot resolve it, then the Pastor may be called. Under no circumstances should a parent or student come to the Pastor, deacons, or principal with a problem until it has been discussed with whomever the parent or student is grieved. (See Matthew Chapter 18)

J. Parent-Teacher Conferences:

Parent-teacher conferences will be called the 1st and 3rd quarters. Special conferences will be held if a parent or teacher requests them.

K. Telephone Use:

Students may not use school or church phones except in an emergency. The secretary or teacher will decide if it is an emergency. Calls are to be made during breaks. Local calls will be \$.25 and long distance calls will be \$.50. Payment is to be made at the time of the call. Emergency calls are of short duration.

L. Fire Drills:

A fire drill will be held each month school is in session, in compliance with local and state codes. Severe weather drills will also be conducted.

M. Family Envelopes:

These are sent home with school communications and are to be returned within two school days signed and dated by a parent or guardian. **Lost envelopes will be replaced at the cost of \$.50.**

N. Transportation To and From School:

Students who are transported by various drivers must have a list of these authorized drivers on file with the school office.

O. Dismissal Fee Statement:

Any student dismissed from the school is not entitled to a refund. Any balance owed at dismissal should be satisfied in one week.

V. ACADEMICS

A. Absence:

State law requires children to be in school, and T.B.A. will not be a party to truancy. The only excuses for being absent from school, which will be accepted without question is a) sickness and b) death in the family. The Principal on an individual basis may accept certain other excuses. Medical and dental appointments will be acceptable excuses, but the entire day should not be taken for these. **A written excuse from the student's parent must be brought the day a student returns to school.** The excuse must contain the dates and specific reason for the absence. Excused absences allow the student to make up missed work. An unexcused absence means the student gets and "F" on all work due while he was absent. The school may withhold credit for any course in which a high school student has 15 absences in one semester. K-8 students who have 30 absences in one year may be retained in the same grade.

B. Teacher Aids and Volunteers:

All teacher aids and volunteers, assisting during school hours in the classroom with students must meet the same dress and code of conduct standards for any staff member. (Special handouts available). The only exception would be to those volunteers helping with after school projects.

C. Mid-term Report Slips:

Mid-term report slips will be sent home at the mid-point of each grading period, beginning with the second grading period. Any failing grades will be circled in red. Parents are asked to sign the report slips and return them to school the next school day.

D. Report Cards:

1. Report cards will be sent home after each 9 weeks. The report card must be signed by a parent and returned.
2. Honor roll is gained by completion of three or more PACES per quarter per major subject. An “A” or “B” grade average must also be maintained. In A-Beka, it is gained by all “B”’s or better.
3. Grading: Generally, grades will be given on the following scale for traditional classes.

4. Final report cards will not be released to the student until:
 - a. All library books have been returned and fines paid.
 - b. Final grades will not be placed into the student’s cumulative record until all tuition and fees for the year have been paid.

E. Academic Failure:

Grades are important indicators of the skills a student has acquired in a

given subject. It is not a favor to promote a child who is unable to do the work, and who will be constantly frustrated; moreover, the three “R’s” are basic to learning. **Grades 7-12** A student who receives an “F” in any course as a semester grade will not get credit toward graduation for that course for that semester.

VI. Athletic Program

A. General Guidelines:

T.B.A. will endeavor to provide some sports activities in competition with other Christian schools. It is hoped that both girls and boys basketball, volleyball, and others will be arranged. Students must have a C- average or better, with no “F’s” to be eligible to compete in sports. Student’s receiving an “F” on a report card will not be eligible to play for a period of three weeks, at which time the teacher of the course in which the student received the “F” will declare if the student is eligible. Ineligible students may not play or practice with the team. A student who receives excessive demerits becomes ineligible to participate in sports for the remainder of the semester. Attendance at all games and practices is mandatory. Discipline will occur after the first unexcused absence. Athletes ought to inform coaches before practice if they cannot be at the practice. Any improper or questionable behavior will not be permitted. Disciplinary measures will be taken the first time, expulsion from the team on the second offence. Let your performance do your talking for you. One’s conduct must always glorify God. Athletics at a Christian school is a privilege not a right.

B. Uniforms and Equipment:

Your coach will issue you a uniform before the first contest. It is your responsibility to keep it clean and in good shape. **Lost or damaged uniforms must be paid for in full.** A \$5 charge for use of uniforms is due at the beginning of each sport season. Check with your coach for the type of practice uniform that he desires you to wear. Treat school equipment with care. If your coach gives you responsibility for team equipment, see that you job is carried out completely. The student will pay for any loss or damage of school equipment due to neglect or carelessness by a student.

D. Injuries

All injuries must be reported to your coach so the proper aid may be given. Be sure to let your coach know of any allergies or other ailments that require special attention. All serious injuries requiring special medical attention should be reported to the office.

E. Physical Exams:

Every athlete and cheerleader should have a physical exam before the season begins. This is your responsibility. Students may not participate until an exam is submitted to the school office.

F. Insurance

T.B.A. does not carry insurance for the athlete or the cheerleader. Treatment costs must be borne by the family's health insurance.

G. Transportation (to and from contests):

You will ride in school vehicles unless otherwise specified by your coach. Vehicles are to remain clean. Riding to a game or meet is not designed for extremes of talking, laughing, and socializing. Prepare yourself for the upcoming contest while riding to it. Take the time to conform yourself to God's will and you'll reap the benefits of your preparation. No radios or tape players are allowed at any athletic event or on school transportation. When boys and girls are riding in the same vehicle, they will not be allowed to sit together. An athlete has enough occasions to be distracted from the contest at hand and we don't want this to be a stumbling block. To practice: If you are riding school vehicles, the same rules apply as when riding to a game. If you are driving or riding with someone else, you are to conduct yourself in a way that will be in line with God's principles. Remember, that even though you are driving to practice or a game or are riding with another student, you must have written permission from your parents beforehand. This can be kept on file with your coach. A brother and sister may be allowed to ride together to practice. No couples will be allowed to do so.

H. Athletic Fees

This fee must be paid in full by the third game or student(s) will not be allowed to participate in the third game and any games thereafter.

I. Athletic Code of Conduct Handbook

A handbook will be given to parents and student participants. All parents and student participants will be required to attend a preseason meeting each year with the director presiding.
